Many links have already been posted on our Triad Woodcarvers Website. We hope you have taken advantage of them for new carving ideas.

Scam Protection: Several Club members have received e-mail messages purporting to be a Club member who is occupied and asking for assistance. The initial message seems very legitimate and we all want to be helpful, especially in this time of stress. The follow-up message requesting we buy gift cards seems quite obvious to be a scam. But our concern is that more sophisticated efforts may be used to do harm to the Club and its members.

Jesse Calderone gives the following advice: "I have worked in IT for a bit and read a lot on these types of things. I used to help govern email and security for a university.

Always be suspicious of:

-Strange grammar and sentence structure.

-Calls of urgency, anytime an email is saying 'quick' or 'urgent'.

-Emails that are from friends but seem to contain a message that could be directed at anyone.

-Any call for monetary assistance, especially when it is ill-defined and strange.

-Any call for employment, often scams try to convince you to do a job for a friend like dog walking and will try to get financial information from you for your 'payment'.

-Any email from a friend that does not read like it was written by your friend.

"Most 'phishing' scams tend to get into your email account and send to everyone in your address book. So, if you get a strange email from someone you know, always reply to them in a new and separate email asking politely if it was really them who had sent the message. It won't hurt your friendship and it will keep you safe. It will also alert that person that their account was used to spread a scam. Deleting emails you know are scams is recommended.

"NEVER download a file attached to a strange email. If you did not ask for a download or a file, then it is likely a virus or some other malware." Thanks, Jesse
